A Summary of Stream Team Activities

Remember the excitement we all felt as kids when that special day was approaching. That day you didn't have to share with anyone! It was your day, YOUR BIRTHDAY! Some things continue to grow older and continue to generate excitement; one of those is the Stream Team Program.

This year Stream Team turned 20-years-old, and our Stream Celebration Weekend held in Waynesville (home of Stream Team #1) during June helped us commemorate 20 years of significant accomplishments. In addition, we added our 4000th Team, another milestone worth celebrating! A total of 266 Teams joined throughout the year, putting us at a grand total of 4115 Teams statewide.

To document our first 20 years, a 28-minute film was developed by Stream Team 1875 member Jim Karpowicz and featured Teams, events, and tons of volunteer dedication. Not only was the DVD a success amongst our volunteers, it has received the Earthwatch Institute's "Film of the Year" award and has been nominated for an Emmy.

It has been an exciting 20 years and the ownership belongs to our dedicated

volunteers! We did more than celebrate our past during 2009 though. Here are some of the accomplishments:

- ◆ 869 tons of trash were removed from Missouri waterways.
- ◆ 1,369 water quality monitoring trips were completed.
- ◆ 17,546 trees were planted.
- ◆ 412 storm drains were stenciled.
- ◆ 62 habitat improvements were completed.
- ◆ Stream Team Academy hosted *An Introduction to Mussels* and *An Introduction to Groundwater & Streams*.
- ◆ \$2.5 million dollars worth of volunteer labor was dedicated.

Dedication & Enthusiasm

Water Quality Monitoring

This Stream Team activity attracts many of our volunteers to become involved with the Program. By monitoring their own adopted streams, they can make a real contribution to the work being done throughout the state by providing data that otherwise would go uncollected. During 2009, 485 volunteers attended 40 workshops.

We have trained nearly 6,700 volunteers since the activity was introduced in 1993, averaging over 400 volunteers attending these workshops annually. The water quality workshops are structured to offer different levels of involvement so each volunteer can determine how much time and effort he or she wishes to put forth. However, a large majority of those from whom we don't hear back after receiving their initial training, just need a little help getting started. This is the group we began to make a concerted effort to mentor. With a bit more assistance after a workshop, they should have more confidence in their own abilities and

feel better-equipped to monitor on their own. Changes implemented during 2009 will increase a volunteer's confidence in his own abilities, encourage individuals to submit much needed data on our Missouri streams, and attend the more advanced levels of training so their data is more often utilized.

In order to provide this kind of mentoring, we reduced the number of workshops offered each year and began holding review sessions at field locations across the state. During "odd-numbered" years, we will hold a reduced number of Introductory Level workshops in order to make us more available in the spring for sessions designed for reviewing invertebrate collection and identification as well as stream discharge. During the "even-numbered" years, we will hold a reduced number of Level 1 workshops in order to hold review sessions demonstrating chemical monitoring procedures, conducting a visual survey, collecting and identifying invertebrates, and stream discharge methods.

In addition, for individuals who have successfully completed the Level 2 QA/QC workshop, we will have specific projects available. These projects will be based on needs of DNR and/or MDC. Each project will include:

- A three-year minimum commitment
- A sample plan based on data needs
- A mechanism that allows us to provide feedback to the volunteer (in report form) at specified increments

These projects will be voluntary, but do require additional commitment from volunteers. However, it will provide opportunities for volunteers to work on specific projects and provide quality data that will truly be used to meet the needs of the sponsoring agencies; this should lead to a higher retention of volunteers.

By implementing these changes and requiring more participation before monitoring equipment is dispersed, we can save the Program money, better train our volunteers, and end up with more and better quality data!

Stream Team Awards

Teams Working Together

Associations allow Teams throughout a watershed or geographic area to partner up. This allows them to share resources, knowledge, and experience. Several Associations throughout the state continued to gain momentum in 2009.

A regional gathering in southwest Missouri spawned the development of a new Association as well. A meeting was initiated by the Wildcat Glades Conservation and Audubon Center Stream Team in Joplin, and 25 people participated in a potluck barbeque and received information from Program staff. throughout the state. This year they received a 319 mini-grant to assist in introducing themselves to Stream Teams. They also received a grant from the Missouri Department of Conservation and are looking towards hiring an Executive Director with this funding.
